Sickle Cell Proclamation

The Board considered a request from the Eastern Carolina Chapter of Sickle Cell Association for adoption of the following proclamation designating September as “Sickle Cell Month”. Commissioner Sampson moved for adoption of the proclamation, seconded by Commissioner Phillips and unanimously carried in a roll call vote.

**PROCLAMATION
OF
SICKEL CELL AWARENESS MONTH
2001**

WHEREAS, sickle cell, a debilitating blood disease which causes pain, infection, economic strain and even death among African Americans and other groups; and

WHEREAS, it is an inherited disease, affecting one of every 294 African American North Carolinians born with sickle cell disease and one out of every 10 with sickle cell trait, meaning that he or she carries the gene for this condition; and

WHEREAS, treatment is available to help those with sickle cell lead more productive and rewarding lives, although there is no known cure for this disease; and

WHEREAS, since 1973, the North Carolina Sickle Cell Syndrome Program has provided quality services throughout the State. Provision of services is a collaborative effort between regional educators/counselors, community-based programs, major medical centers, local health departments and the State Laboratory of Public Health. Services include screening of all newborns at birth, general screening by request for public at local health departments, education, genetic counseling, service coordination, medical reimbursement and social support for affected persons; and

WHEREAS, support for research on the treatment and management of this disorder is vital to improving the health and quality of life of persons with sickle cell disease;

NOW, THEREFORE, the CRAVEN COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS proclaims September 2001 as “**SICKLE CELL AWARENESS MONTH**” in Craven County and urges our citizens to recognize and support his observance.

Subdivision for Approval

At the recommendation of the Planning Board, the following subdivision was considered for approval. Commissioner Sampson moved for its approval, seconded by Commissioner Phillips and unanimously carried in a roll call vote.

Wavy Meadows Phase 2, Section 1 – Final: The property, owned by Luther Waddell and surveyed by Simmons & Associates, is located within Twp 7 along Luke Court. The subdivision contains 7 lots and is proposed to be served by community water and sewer. The Planning Board reviewed and recommended the subdivision for final approval.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT FEES

Ms. Wanda Sandel , Health Director, presented the following adjusted fee schedule, as recommended by the Board of Health at their meeting on September 10, 2001, for dental procedures. The request was to establish these fees as posted charges to be implemented for a sliding fee scale and for use by insurance carriers. The previous fees reflected the Medicaid rate. In addition, she requested that new fees be established for foster family physical exams, RPR, and blood pressure requests. Commissioner Allen moved to approve the requested fees, as follows, seconded by Commissioner Talton and unanimously carried. Commissioner Allen informed the Board that as a member of the Health Board, he routinely abstains from voting on matters that are to come before the Board of Commissioners, to avoid voting twice.

Commissioner Allen moved to allow Ms. June Rodd, who was not on the agenda, to address the Board. Commissioner Phillips seconded, and the motion carried unanimously. Ms. Rodd presented her personal opinion concerning the proposal for redistricting. She stated that Commissioner District 6 would lose 600 voters to Commissioner District 5, under the proposed plan. She registered strong objection to redistricting on these lines because it would remove those voters from a district where they are currently allowed to vote for 5 Commissioners and realign them with a district in which they would only have a vote for one Commissioner. The Board received Ms. Rodd's comments.

FY 2001 NCHFA SINGLE FAMILY REHABILITATION GRANT

Planning Director, Don Baumgardner, requested that the Board approve the following Resolution of Local Commitment and Application for Single Family Rehabilitation. Commissioner Sampson moved to adopt the requested resolution and provide the County's match at the appropriate time. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Tyson and unanimously carried.

WHEREAS, Craven County wishes to demonstrate local support for its proposed FY 02 NCHFA Single-Family Rehabilitation project; and

WHEREAS, the County wishes to submit a competitive application to the North Carolina Housing Finance Agency; and

WHEREAS, the County wishes to authorize the Chairman to approve and certify the final application prior to submission;

NOW, THEREFORE, the Craven County Board of Commissioners hereby resolves to commit \$20,000 in local revenue to the FY02 NCHFA Single-Family Rehabilitation Program, if the project is funded. These finds will be disbursed during the FY 2002-03 budget year.

The Board of Commissioners further resolves that the Chairman may approve the final application and execute required certifications as the designated representative of Craven County.

Resolved this 17th day of September, 2001.

REDISTRICTING RESOLUTION

The Board considered adoption of an official resolution accepting a proposed redistricting plan, which was presented by Ms. Debra Stagner of Tharrington-Smith on September 17th and approved by the Board at that time. Commissioner Allen stated the belief that the proposal submitted was not the best way to accomplish the objective of redistricting. Commissioner Phillips expressed disagreement with the district lines being based upon the census population, as opposed to the electorate. Commissioner Bland reminded the Board that it had voted to approve the plan at its last meeting with the understanding that the official resolution would follow. Commissioner Sampson stated that the plan, as presented, is not perfect but there is not enough time to deliberate on it further. He expressed the opinion that it needed to be adopted in order to comply with Justice Department requirements, and that the Board should reserve further deliberation and refinement until after the next election. Commissioner Sampson moved to adopt the

official resolution accepting the proposed redistricting plan, seconded by Commissioner Bland. The motion failed, there being four (4) “Nays” from Commissioners Allen, Phillips, Tyson, and Talton, with three (3) “Ayes” from Commissioners Bland, Sampson, and Toon. Commissioner Tyson observed that any redistricting plan, no matter how it is aligned, would shift approximately 3,200 voters into a single vote district. Commissioner Phillips went on record to state that he has never voted for the proposed plan. Commissioner Talton suggested that, since citizens seem to be dissatisfied with the entire voting process in Craven County, the time may be opportune for looking at the entire process, including the method of voting for Commissioners in Craven County. Commissioner Allen recommended that the County adopt a plan whereby all Commissioners would be voted on either countywide or district wide. Commissioner Toon stated that district wide voting was the original plan approved by the Justice Department in Craven County; however, the Board subsequently agreed to allow five (5) Commissioners to be voted on countywide. Commissioner Talton explained that he had voted against the plan at this time because he believes that it should be a unanimous decision. He had previously thought that all Commissioners were in support of the plan. Commissioner Tyson suggested that Ms. Stagner and Mr. Mike Crowell of Tharrington-Smith, return to help the Board refine the proposed plan and to seek their advice on changing the voting method in Craven County. Commissioner Bland moved that the Board establish a meeting time for a special or reconvened meeting for this purpose, seconded by Commissioner Talton and unanimously carried.

TAX REVALUATION UPDATE

Craven County Tax Administrator, Ronnie Antry, explained to the Board that there have been no challenges or appeals of the schedule of values which was presented to the Board of Commissioners on June 11th and adopted. He introduced Phil Nelson, Chief Appraiser, who provided an update on the progress of the revaluation project. He highlighted some aspects of the process and informed the Board that taxpayers received a detailed brochure concerning the revaluation along with their current tax bills.

APPOINTMENTS

APES Regional Council

The Board deferred an appointment to replace Bobbi Waters as the County’s representative on the APES Regional Council, pending recommendations.

Nursing Home Advisory Committee

The Board considered a request from Ms. Angela Hollowell of the Area Agency on Aging, for two additional appointments to the Nursing Home Advisory Committee, as allowed by statute. Commissioner Sampson nominated Mr. Peter Fisher, who had expressed interest in appointment to this committee. Commissioner Sampson moved to close nominations, seconded by Commissioner Talton and unanimously carried, with Mr. Fisher being appointed by acclamation. There remains one additional requested appointment to be made to this committee.

Upcoming Appointments

The Board was advised of upcoming appointments in October on the Firemen’s Relief Fund Board of Trustees and the Industrial Facilities Pollution Control Financing Authority.

COUNTY MANAGER’S REPORT

Reconvened Session

County Manager, Harold Blizzard, advised the Board that Ms. Stagner and Mr. Crowell of Tharrington-Smith, would not be available to meet with the Board until September 25th

at 9:00 a.m. It was the Board's consensus to recess the meeting to reconvene at 9:00 a.m. on September 25, 2001.

Request by City of New Bern

Mr. Blizzard discussed with the Board a request by the City of New Bern that the County institute some form of land use controls and/or nuisance abatement measures in an area adjacent to Taberna. He explained that the City cannot exercise its ETJ in a satellite area. Commissioner Tyson inquired if the County could grant extraterritorial jurisdiction powers to a non-contiguous section of the City, or if such an action would be precluded by statute. It was the consensus of the Board to direct the County Attorney to research this question.

COMMISSIONERS' REPORTS

Commissioner Allen moved to adopt the following resolution that was forwarded from the National Association of Counties. Commissioner Sampson seconded the motion, which carried unanimously.

**RESOLUTION
IN RESPONSE TO
TERRORISM**

WHEREAS, on September 11, 2001, the United States was suddenly and brutally attacked by foreign terrorists, and;

WHEREAS, these terrorists hijacked and destroyed four civilian aircraft, crashing two of them into the towers of the World Trade Center in New York City, and a third into the Pentagon outside Washington, DC, and;

WHEREAS, thousands of innocent Americans were killed and injured as a result of these attacks, including the passengers and crew of the four aircraft, workers in the World Trade Center and in the Pentagon, rescue workers, and bystanders, and;

WHEREAS, these cowardly acts were by far the deadliest terrorist attacks ever launched against the United States, and, by targeting symbols of American strength and success, clearly were intended to intimidate our nation and weaken its resolve, and;

WHEREAS, these horrific events have affected all Americans. It is important that we carry on with regular activities of our lives. Terrorism cannot be allowed to break the spirit of the American people, and the best way to show these cowards that they have truly failed is for the people of the United States and their counties to stand tall and proud,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the governing board of Craven County condemns the cowardly and deadly actions of these terrorists, and;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the governing board of Craven County supports the President of the United States, as he works with his national security team to defend against additional attacks, and find the perpetrators to bring them to justice; and

BE IT STILL FURTHER RESOLVED, that the governing board of Craven County recommends to its citizens to support relief efforts by giving blood at the nearest available blood donation center.

Adopted this 17th day of September, 2001.

Commissioner Allen also asked the Board to be prepared to make a decision on the posting of the Ten Commandments by its reconvened meeting on September 25th.

Commissioner Talton clarified that the legislation that was passed allowing posting of the Ten Commandments was limited to schools and school boards. He moved that the Board make a decision not to post it in the Courthouse and in County Buildings. However, the motion was withdrawn after discussion.

Commissioner Sampson commented on the growing sense of cooperation among citizens in the wake of the terrorist attacks on New York and Washington. He expressed the desire that people should work together in good times as well as during disasters.

Commissioner Bland commented on the success of the Red Cross Blood Drive that was held on September 15th.

At 10:40 a.m. Commissioner Tyson moved to recess until 9:00 a.m. on September 25, 2001, seconded by Commissioner Allen and unanimously carried.
