Following an invocation by Commissioner Tyson and the Pledge of Allegiance, Commissioner Tyson moved to approve the modified agenda, as presented, seconded by Commissioner McCabe and unanimously carried. The Chairman explained that the modification occurred when the Justice Assistance Grant public hearing was removed due to the necessity to re-advertise it. Commissioner Sampson moved to approve the minutes of February 17, 2014, seconded by Commissioner McCabe and unanimously carried.

**PETITIONS OF CITIZENS**

*Howard Humphreys, 2603 Old Cherry Point Road, New Bern*, commended the Commissioners on the extraordinary amount of work accomplished in calendar year 2013, such as redistricting, budget austerity and ad valorem tax decrease. In regards to Commissioners' reports, he stated the expectation that Commissioners should always have something to report from the intervening weeks between meetings as opposed to talking about matters they can do nothing about. He expressed interest in hearing reports from the various boards and committees upon which they serve.

*Frank Radicella, 305 War Admiral Drive*, appeared representing the Cherry Branch Homeowners Association, requesting an ordinance to prevent the discharge of fire arms in backyards. He stated there are currently 455 half-acre homes, with 90 more coming. He asked for help from the Commissioners with this situation.

*Ray Griffin, Vanceboro*, commented on the issue of not being able to pray in the name of Jesus.

*Charlie Simmons, 2218 Tuscarora Rhems Road, New Bern*, spoke about his concern regarding unpaved private roads in his area. He stated that loggers have caused damage to Staten Road and Farrow Road and have not repaired them. He feels that there should be an ordinance preventing loggers from going in on wet roads because this creates a problem for emergency vehicles getting through.

**CRAVEN COMMUNITY CHLD PROTECTION TEAM (CCCPT) REPORT AND REQUEST FOR PROCLAMATION**

Terry Brubaker, Program Manager, Child and Community Services Division, Social Services, presented the CCCPT report, as required annually. The Clerk was asked to provide the Board with a copy of the presentation. Ms. Brubaker also requested that the Board adopt a proclamation of April as Child Abuse Prevention Month in Craven County. She stated that the following ceremonies will be held in honor of this event:

- Friday, April 4, at 9:00 a.m. in Havelock at the Walter B. Jones Park, or at the courtroom if the weather is bad.

Commissioner Allen moved to adopt the following proclamation, as requested, seconded by Commissioner McCabe and unanimously carried.

**PROCLAMATION  
CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION MONTH  
2014**

**WHEREAS**, children are vital to our County's future prosperity and quality of life; and

**WHEREAS**, all children deserve to have safe, stable, nurturing and healthy homes and communities that foster well-being; and

**WHEREAS**, child abuse and neglect have public ramifications, affecting both the current and future progress of Craven County; and

**WHEREAS**, to prevent child abuse, parents need support and resources to help cope with stress and to nurture their children's growth to their full potential; and

**WHEREAS**, effective child abuse prevention strategies succeed through partnerships created amongst citizens, human services agencies, schools, faith communities, health care providers, civic organizations, law enforcement agencies and the business community; and

**WHEREAS**, Craven County is committed to preventing child abuse, and calls upon citizens from all walks of life to increase their participation in efforts to support families, and thereby strengthening communities by preventing child abuse.

**NOW, THEREFORE**, the Craven County Board of Commissioners hereby proclaims April 2014 as "**CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION MONTH**" in Craven County and commends its observance to all citizens.

**REQUEST FOR RED CROSS MONTH PROCLAMATION**

Joy Branham, Chief Executive Officer, Coastal Carolina Chapter of American Red Cross, presented a proclamation of March as Red Cross Month. She stated that 102 volunteers have donated 25,000 hours of service and they have reached 135,000 people in the last year with preparedness information. She commented that there have been 53 home fires in the past year. Commissioner Sampson moved to adopt the proclamation, as presented, seconded by Commissioner McCabe and unanimously carried.

**DEPARTMENTAL MATTERS: HEALTH – HOME HEALTH CERTIFICATE OF NEED (CON) AGREEMENT**

*Contract with CliftonLarsonAllen, LLP*

Craven County Health Director, Scott Harrelson, presented to the Board a contract with CliftonLarsonAllen, LLP in the amount of \$39,000 for consultant services related to the sale of the County’s Home Health Certificate of Need (CON). Commissioner Tyson inquired what would be done with the proceeds of such sale. Mr. Harrelson responded that it may be held in reserve for the first year of operating costs of an inpatient hospice facility. Commissioners Tyson and Dacey stated that there needs to be more discussion about this proposal. County Manager, Jack Veit, stated that there is plenty of time to decide on the use of sale proceeds and recommended that they be put into the general fund in the interim. Commissioner Allen moved to approve the contract with CliftonLarsonAllen, LLP, as presented, seconded by Commissioner Sampson and unanimously carried in a roll call vote.

*Attorney Fees*

Mr. Harrelson reported that legal service fees for the project are separate and above the fees charged by CliftonLarsonAllen. He presented a low bid of \$250 per hour from Sumrell, Sugg, Carmichael, Hicks and Hart, PA Law Firm, with the expected total to be in the range of \$15,000 to \$20,000. Commissioner Tyson moved to accept the low bid of legal services from Sumrell, Sugg, Carmichael, Hicks & Hart, PA, seconded by Commissioner McCabe and unanimously carried in a roll call vote.

**DEPARTMENTAL MATTERS: PLANNING**

*Request to Set Public Hearing for FY 13 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Funding Cycle*

Craven County Planning Director, Don Baumgardner, requested to set a public hearing for March 17, 2014 at 8:30 a.m. to hear public comments regarding the County’s intent to apply for FY2013 CDBG Infrastructure funding. The previous decision by the State of not having to hold a second public hearing has been rescinded and the County is now required to hold two public hearings. The first public hearing was held on February 17. It is anticipated that up to \$750,000 for infrastructure projects will be available. A presentation will be given at the 2<sup>nd</sup> public hearing as to the project for which the County intends to apply. Commissioner McCabe moved to schedule a public hearing for March 17 at 8:30 a.m., as requested, seconded by Commissioner Tyson and unanimously carried.

*Request for Road Addition to State Maintained Secondary Road*

Mr. Baumgardner requested that the Board adopt a road addition resolution to approve Dudley Street to be turned over to the State of North Carolina for maintenance. The resolution, once passed, will be forwarded to the NC Department of Transportation (DOT) for their final consideration and acceptance of the road to the State Maintenance System. Commissioner Sampson asked Mr. Baumgardner to explain the procedure for getting to this point. Mr. Baumgardner explained that there must be a 50’ right-of-way recorded, and if not, it must be built into the roads. Roads in existence prior to 1973 must be brought to a specified standard.

Commissioner McCabe moved to adopt the standard SR 2 Road Addition Resolution to approve Dudley Street to be turned over to the State of North Carolina for maintenance, seconded by Commissioner Sampson and unanimously carried.

*Request to Adopt Hazard Mitigation Grant (HMG) Project Budget Amendment and Ordinance*

Mr. Baumgardner stated that in order to move forward with the Hazard Mitigation Grant Project, the Board needs to adopt the following budget amendment and budget ordinance in the amount of \$531,220. This project is proposed to elevate four repetitively damaged residential structures and is 100% federal and state funding, with no County funds required. Chairman Mark emphasized the location of the four homes as follows:

- 407 Harbour Drive, New Bern
- 415 Riverside Drive, New Bern
- 417 Riverside Drive, New Bern
- One home in River Bend

Commissioner McCabe moved to adopt the following budget amendment and ordinance update, as requested, seconded by Commissioner Sampson and carried with six (6) “ayes”, there being one (1) “nay” from Commissioner Allen.

**WHEREAS**, the Poe family has selflessly given countless hours of their time to help others, previously supporting events such as the Special Olympics, local high school ROTC drill competitions, community marathons, Marine Corps Ball fundraisers, and family Christmas parties.

**COMMISSIONERS' RULES OF PROCEDURE**

County Attorney, Jim Hicks, presented the updated draft document, which incorporates changes that were agreed upon at the Board's last work session.

There was question as to Rule #10 relative to the definition of the word "germane". Commissioner Taylor asked that the speaker sign-up sheet referenced in Rule #10 specify the subject of the speaker's comments. Commissioner Dacey moved to approve the proposed rules of procedure. The motion died for lack of a second.

Commissioner Sampson moved to defer adoption until the Board's next meeting, seconded by Commissioner McCabe and unanimously carried.

**COUNTY MANAGER'S REPORT***Meeting with Legislative Delegation*

County Manager, Jack Veit, discussed with the Board the Legislative Goals of the North Carolina Association of County Commissioners (NCACC) in preparation for communicating with the County's Legislative Delegation to the N.C. General Assembly.

*NCACC Legislative Update*

Mr. Veit shared with the Board a video provided by NCACC showing that there has been \$6 million lost in lottery funds since 2009 in Craven County.

*Budget Work Sessions*

## COMMISSIONERS' REPORTS

*Commissioner McCabe* requested that the Board adopt a proclamation honoring Craven County's African American Patriots of the American Revolutionary War to be presented at a ceremony at the Harlowe Community Center on March 16. Members of the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR) will be present to recognize these patriots. Commissioner McCabe moved to adopt the following resolution, seconded by Commissioner Taylor and unanimously carried.

### PROCLAMATION Honoring African American Revolutionary War Patriots of Craven County

**WHEREAS**, America's Revolutionary War included all types of Patriots, with different ethnic backgrounds and races; and

**WHEREAS**, from 1775 to 1783, an estimated 5,000 to 10,000 slaves and free persons served as soldiers, marines and patriots in the Revolutionary War in addition to tens of thousands of men, women and children who provided civilian assistance, ran away from slavery and petitioned courts and legislatures for freedom; and

**WHEREAS**, more than 250 African Americans served in the Revolutionary War from 39 of 100 counties in North Carolina; and

**WHEREAS**, 14 African American soldiers and patriots from Craven County, participated in the struggle for independence, including:

**WHEREAS**, this small group of Patriots in eastern North Carolina have not, until now, been honored or remembered through graveside markings, ceremonies or other patriotic remembrances accorded many of their compatriots; and

**WHEREAS**, the North Carolina Society, Sons of the American Revolution will host a ceremony on March 16, 2014 honoring these 14 Forgotten Revolutionary War Patriots by dedicating a memorial marker at the Harlowe Community Center.

**NOW THEREFORE**, the Craven County Board of Commissioners proclaims its pride in being the home county of these forgotten Patriots who fought for the cause of liberty throughout the Revolution.

**Adopted this 6<sup>th</sup> day of March, 2014.**

Commissioner McCabe extended an invitation to the March 16 event at 2:00 p.m. He stated that a bridge on Mill Road is in need of replacement. He announced his attendance at the Havelock basketball play-off game in Fayetteville, in which Havelock was defeated. He commented that his mother is very ill and he may not be able to make some of the meetings on boards and committees to which he is assigned due to her illness.

*Commissioner Allen* reported on *pro bono* electrical contracting work he has performed at First Baptist Church in Havelock and other locations in the last two weeks.

*Commissioner Tyson* reported on recent facts he has learned by serving on the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO), including discussion about ferry tolls. He stated that there are several ferry replacements needed.

These costs will be required to come out of local transportation funding allocations, since the ferry system is part of the DOT system. A \$33 million impact is expected for local roads programs.

*Commissioner Dacey* stated that the Airport Authority met on February 18 and announced that the airport will be resurfacing one runway in the next couple of months. On February 20, ACT met and heard from Cassidy and Associates regarding working on community/military partnership strategies. They are currently getting a couple of joint strike fighters in but can handle more. He commented that Senator Hagan has been helpful with this initiative.

*Commissioner Sampson* announced that the New Bern Housing Authority received a planning grant in the amount of \$400,000 for housing, with a goal of providing access to address people's needs for decent housing. He stated that the RPO – TAC also dealt with the ferry toll issue. He commented on rising gas, diesel and fuel prices, stating that if nobody says anything about this problem, then nothing will get done.

*Commissioner Taylor* announced his involvement in the Reading Across America at Bangert Elementary School. He serves on Partners in Education (PIE) and stated that teachers submitted 37 grants, with \$1,500 distributed. Year-to -date, they have distributed \$4,300. He noted that he spoke with Dover's Mayor Wetherington and the municipal water department to see if they have issues that the County can help mitigate. He stated they are planning to open a Dover Library, which will not be in the tri-county system, but with hopes to be included eventually.

*Chairman Mark* announced his attendance at the Highway 17 Association meeting, where their goal is to complete four –laning from the Beaufort County line down to 43, and then to connect with the Bridgeton segment.

#### CLOSED SESSION
