Following an invocation by Commissioner Liner and the Pledge of Allegiance, Commissioner Dacey moved to amend the agenda by re-positioning item #1.B, Comments Related to Proposed Resolution Concerning Refugee Resettlement, to Item #6.A, seconded by Commissioner Tyson and unanimously carried.

Commissioner Mark moved to approve the minutes of January 19, 2016 regular session, seconded by Commissioner Sampson and unanimously carried.

The Chairman stated the following ground rules for petitions of citizens. In regards to general comments, a four minute maximum will be permitted per speaker. In regards to comments related to the proposed resolution concerning refugee resettlement, there will be a time limit of 30 minutes for those in favor of the resolution and 30 minutes for those against the resolution, with a three minute maximum per person. Citizens in attendance were asked to refrain from any outbursts during the presentations and discussion.

**PROCLAMATION
HONORING MRS. ARABELLE B. BRYANT
COMMUNITY STALWART AND EDUCATOR**

WHEREAS, Mrs. Arabelle B. Bryant grew up in Rocky Mount, North Carolina, where she graduated from Booker T. Washington High School; and

WHEREAS, she subsequently earned a Bachelor’s Degree in mathematics, with a minor in Library Science at North Carolina College for Negroes (North Carolina Central University), and later pursued graduate studies at Columbia University and North Carolina Central University, where she received a Master’s Degree in Library Science; and

WHEREAS, Mrs. Bryant moved to New Bern around 1944 to teach mathematics at West Street High School, and also became the librarian; and

WHEREAS, she became the librarian at J.T. Barber High School in 1956, serving until her retirement in 1980, having influenced more than 2,000 students who passed through the school during her 24 year tenure; and

WHEREAS, in addition to her legacy as an educator, Mrs. Bryant’s contributions to the community at large are numerous, and include: faithful membership and dedicated leadership in Ebenezer Presbyterian Church for more than 50 years; service on the New Bern-Craven County Library Board, Craven County Board of Health, New Bern Housing Authority Board, Craven Community Concerts Board, Red Cross Board, as Day Captain for the RCS Soup Kitchen, and Vice President of the Historic Dryborough Association, to name a few; and

WHEREAS, her many honors include induction into the Order of the Long Leaf Pine by Governor Hunt; and

WHEREAS, she is the very proud mother of Harold Bryant, Jr. and Matlynn Bryant Yeoman; grandmother of Armand Bryant; and great-grandmother of Amaya Bryant, which she considers among her finest achievements.

NOW THEREFORE, the Craven County Board of Commissioners issues this proclamation in recognition of Mrs. Arabelle Bullock Bryant’s exemplary contributions that have enhanced our community.

Request to Set Close-Out Public Hearing for FY 12 CDBG Infrastructure Program

The Craven County Planning Department requested that the Board set a public hearing on February 15, 2016 at 8:30 a.m. to review the budget and activities that have been accomplished through the County’s FY 12 CDBG Infrastructure Project. The program activities are complete and the County is in the process of closing out the grant. The program accomplishments included new water service to Henderson-Godette Road in the Harlowe area and substantial sewer improvements within the James City area. The total cost of activities was \$727,358.66 in CDBG Program funds, benefitting 100% low to moderate income households. Commissioner Sampson moved to set a public hearing for February 15, 2016 at 8:30 a.m., as requested, seconded by Commissioner McCabe and unanimously carried in a roll call vote.

Subdivisions for Approval

The Board was requested to approve the following subdivisions. The Planning Board met on January 28, 2016 and recommended their approval. Commissioner Sampson moved to approve the following subdivisions, as requested, seconded by Commissioner McCabe and unanimously carried in a roll call vote.

Sandra C. Connor Property – Final: The property, owned by Sandra Connor and surveyed by Joe Chance, PLS, is located within Twp. 7 off of US Highway 70 Service Rd. (SR 1156); Parcel ID 7-054-6-015. The subdivision contains 2 lots on 6.37 acres and is proposed to be served by community water and City of New Bern sewer.

Curtis Lee Morris – Final: The property, owned by Curtis L. Morris and surveyed by Gaskins Land Surveying, P.A., is located within Twp. 1, off of Ward Field Rd. (SR 1451); Parcel ID 1-055-011. The subdivision contains 1 lot on 3.23 acres and is proposed to be served by community water and an existing septic system.

George A. Coeyman – Final: The property, owned by George A. Coeyman and surveyed by James Simmons Surveying, is located within Twp. 5, off of Temples Point Rd. (SR 1711); Parcel ID 5-011-061. The subdivision contains 1 lot on 5.65 acres and is proposed to be served by community water and an existing septic system.

Robin Leary – Final: The property, owned by William Pappas, Jeremy Riggs and Justin Riggs and surveyed by Matthews Surveying, is located within Twp. 3, off of Loop Rd. (SR 1252); Parcel ID 3-024-055. The subdivision contains 1 lot on 2.00 acres and is proposed to be served by community water and an individual septic system. The proposed new road name is Jacob Lane.

Approval of Updates to Sheriff's Department Records Retention Schedule

The Sheriff's Department requested approval of the updated Sheriff's Departments' Record Retention Schedule which was recently published by the N.C. Division of Archives and Records. This is the standard adopted statewide for County Sheriffs' offices. Commissioner Sampson moved to approve the requested updates to the Sheriff's Department Record Retention Schedule, seconded by Commissioner McCabe and unanimously carried in a roll call vote.

DEPARTMENTAL MATTERS: TAX

Report of Unpaid 2015 Taxes

Tax Administrator, Ronnie Antry, presented to the Board the amount of \$2,178,149.39, which reflects 2015 taxes that remain unpaid, and are a lien upon real estate, as required by NCGS 105-369(a).

The total reflects a collection rate of 94.56%. This statute also requires the Board to order Mr. Antry to advertise in a newspaper of general circulation in the County the tax liens for 2015. The Board was requested to authorize that the liens be advertised in *The Sun Journal* on April 18, 2016.

Commissioner Mark moved to authorize that the liens be advertised in *The Sun Journal* on April 18, 2016, as required by statute, seconded by Commissioner McCabe and unanimously carried.

Revaluation Update

Chief Appraiser, Glenn Jones, and Mr. Antry updated the Board on the 2016 revaluation, including activities to date and what to expect in the upcoming months. Mr. Jones reported that there were 57,000 properties to be evaluated. The project is scheduled to be completed in February and notices will be mailed later that month.

DEPARTMENTAL MATTERS: SOLID WASTE – SOLID WASTE AGREEMENT

Since the Board of Commissioners directed staff to proceed with renewing the Convenience Centers Hauling Agreement and Recyclable Materials Collection Exclusive Franchise Agreement in November for an additional three year period, a stipulation was added to the Convenience Centers Hauling Agreement that spilling or blowing of contents from the transported containers be prevented.

Solid Waste Director, Rusty Cotton, advised the Board that there has also been a change to the metal recycling vendor due to the closure of SIMS Metal Management, and two new metal recycling vendors have been identified.

In addition, the current contractor for the Convenience Centers Hauling Agreement (Republic Services) has requested different terms in the Agreement, constituting a material change to the Agreement. As a result, the County must bid out the Hauling Agreement.

Commissioner Dacey moved to authorize execution of the recycling agreement and authorize solicitation of Requests for Proposals for the Convenience Centers Hauling Agreement, seconded by Commissioner McCabe and unanimously carried.

DEPARTMENTAL MATTERS: ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT – REQUEST APPROVAL OF GRANT OF EASEMENT TO PIEDMONT NATURAL GAS

Economic Development Director, Timothy Downs, presented a map prepared in 2001 by Robert Chiles, P.E., which shows a twenty foot easement for a North Carolina Natural Gas main line on the south portion of the Craven County Industrial Park. He informed the Board that the map has been used and relied upon by many parties over the years; however, it has come to light that no Grant of Easement by Craven County was ever recorded. He recommended that the Board approve the Grant of Easement to Piedmont Natural Gas and approve the execution of related documents. Commissioner Tyson moved to approve the Grant of Easement, as requested, seconded by Commissioner McCabe and unanimously carried.

CONSIDERATION OF PROPOSED RESOLUTION CONCERNING REFUGEE RESETTLEMENT

Comments Related to Proposed Resolution Concerning Refugee Resettlement

The following members of the public spoke for and against the resolution in alternating sequence:

For

Dr. Martin Creech – Christian Action League, Raleigh, stated that the resolution is not inconsistent with tenets of the Christian faith, inasmuch as personal conduct is distinguishable from the role of government.

Matt Schowb, 2318 Oakwood Drive, New Bern, asserted that funds would be more effectively spent with the United Nations, High Commission on Refugees (UNHCR), which spends \$1,057 per year per person on expenditures for its resettlement activities overseas in camps in neighboring countries, allowing more refugees to be served. Comparatively, approximately \$12,000 per person per year is spent on resettlement here.

Mark Griffin, 465 Daugherty Road, Dover, a veteran of the war in Iraq, cited MCAS Cherry Point as a potential target for Syrian refugees resettled in the area, who may be embedded to do harm.

Ann Bowman, 105 Kingsmill Ct., New Bern, stated that the local community has no say, and the opposition is not about refugees that are already here. The United Nations should not be dictating who can become a citizen.

Phillip Buffa, 125 Walden Road, New Bern, encouraged taking time to develop more security in the vetting process.

Raynor James, 305 Calico Dr., New Bern, stated that there are refugees in the country already who could become potential targets of terrorists embedded, posing as refugees.

Bruce Hergreaves, 3603 Cranberry Lane, stated that the vetting process is not working and expressed concern about a possible public health issue stemming from the medical condition of some of the arriving refugees.

Glen Fink, 646 Goose Creek Road, New Bern, stated that he is not against all refugee activities.

Hal James, 305 Calico Dr., New Bern, cited Article IV, Section 4 of the United States Constitution.

Joseph Salter, 1110 Hill Neck Road, Ernul, stated that the government should not be paying church organizations to finance refugee resettlement programs.

Ray Griffin, 1981 Streets Ferry Road, Vanceboro, spoke about devastation and corruption in the society.

Johnny Clark, 5560 Hwy. 55 West, Cove City, representing the collective opinions of his church stated that the community should be compassionate, but not with their heads in the sand.

Brad Cummings, 307 Madam Moore's Lane, New Bern, stated that the FBI, Department of Homeland Security and State Department have said that the Syrian refugees cannot be properly vetted.

Against

Winston Dixon, 309 Renny's Creek Dr., New Bern, stated that refugees are subjected to a 8-13 step vetting process over a period of three years before arriving in the community.

Katherine Adolph, 210 Metcalf St., New Bern, evoked the memory of Jews who perished during the Hitler years as a result of closed doors, and spoke about the value of diversity in the community.

Peter Adolph, 210 Metcalf St., New Bern, asked who authorized the proposed resolution, if not the Board.

Rosemary Stark, 66 Shoreline Drive, explained that the red that was displayed by opponents of the resolution represented righteous indignation, embarrassment and innocent blood shed. She stated that 6,700 names have been sign onto the following resolution:

“We, the members of Faith Connection in the New Bern area are solidly behind the provision of hope and promise of a safe and secure life that the refugee program, interfaith Refugee Ministry, provides regardless of religion, nationality, race, ethnicity, gender, or age of the refugee in dire need of refuge, a safe harbor and a home”.

Carolyn Latham, 3412 Windsor Dr., Trent Woods, spoke about her personal experience with exemplary refugees already in the community, specifically the Rhems Methodist Church program.

Erika Foluke, 1717 Spencer Ave., New Bern, stated that in reference to potential “bad apples” among incoming refugees, there are plenty of home grown “bad apples” right here.

Susan Husson, 312 Avenue A, New Bern, stated that UNHCR is the gate keeper for any nation involved in the process, and has no other role. The refugees seen in Europe are not the ones coming to Eastern North Carolina, who work and pay taxes after a brief resettlement period.

Paul Canady, 4504 Wentworth Ct., Trentwoods, expressed concern about potential unintended consequences of the resolution, which could be used by jihadists as propaganda against us.

Susan Jackson Cook, 1230 Brices Creek Road, New Bern, stated that this controversy harkens back to the Japanese internment camps during World War II and the rejected boatloads of Jews – contrary to American ideology.

Lily Kremar, 611 Middle Street, New Bern, stated that the resolution is not substantiated by facts but based on fear. Fear caused a boatload of Jews to be turned back in 1939 only to perish. She also cited internment of Japanese citizens during WWII.

Martha Dzioba, 2124 Royal Pines Dr., New Bern, stated that homegrown terrorists are her biggest fear.

John Jacobson, 508 Metcalf Street, New Bern, stated that the resolution appears to reflect the political statement of Ted Cruz, and asked if Christian refugees would be treated differently, demonstrating religious bigotry.

“Webb” Slaughter, 6509 Windsor Dr., Trent Woods, queried “What would Jesus Do” in these circumstances.

Edward Toth, 1607 Tryon Road, New Bern, stated that the resolution would not result in enforceable action, and questioned the definition of “terrorist”, citing instances of homegrown terror.

Discussion of Proposed Draft Resolution on Refugees from Terrorist Nations

The Chairman asked Commissioner Dacey to lead discussion of the subject resolution, which was continued from the Board’s last meeting. Commissioner Dacey presented an amendment to the resolution on the table, and moved for its adoption, seconded by Commissioners Jones and carried with six (6) “ayes”, there being one (1) “nay” from Commissioner Sampson.

RESOLUTION ON REFUGEES FROM TERRORIST NATIONS (Substitute Amendment)

Whereas, the Obama Administration has pledged to accept as many as 10,000 Syrian and Iraqi refugees into the United States; and

Whereas, due to the conflicts in and around Syria and Iraq, many of the individuals seeking refugee status in the United States are unable to present critical biographical information to those responsible for verifying the identities of such individuals; and

Whereas, the United States House of Representatives’ Committee on Homeland Security has found that many European countries have been overrun with refugees coming in from Syria and North Africa, overburdening the social services of those countries and creating a “look the other way” posture, allowing refugees to move freely within Europe without vetting; and

Whereas, unless proper verification of those individuals from Syria and Iraq can be fully demonstrated it is unlikely a complete threat assessment of those individuals can be performed and that the safety of those who will be asked to live in near proximity to those individuals can be fully guaranteed; and

Whereas, since 1992, the communities located in eastern North Carolina have received as many as 200 refugees each year; and

Whereas, the legitimacy and success of the refugee program based in eastern North Carolina is rooted in the dependability of investigative work of the United Nation’s High Commissioner on Refugees and United States Immigration officials; and

Whereas, historically it has been the practice of refugee relocation agencies to decline the placement of individuals with severe medical problems, a history of mental illness or disability, or those with a criminal record; and

Whereas, as it is the case that neither the United Nation’s High Commissioner on Refugees or United States Immigration officials are currently able to adequately demonstrate that the usual and customary high standards for acceptance into the program for local resettlement can be met, and

Therefore Be It Resolved, that in the interest of safety to our community and the desire to maintain the continued goodwill of those within our community toward ALL refugees finding their way to eastern North Carolina, that the Craven County Board of Commissioners opposes the relocation of any refugee from countries that have significant territory controlled by an organization designated by the State Department to be a Foreign Terrorist Organization, including but not limited to Iraq, Libya, Somalia, Syria and Yemen.

He emphasized that references to Interfaith Refugee Ministries had been removed, and the resolution serves only as a declaration that Craven County opposes the settlement of these refugees.

Commissioner Mark thanked Susan Husson for the time she spent educating him and other Commissioners. He has to take into account all of the citizens.

Commissioner Sampson stated that considering his background, he could have been a citizen or refugee; there are good people and bad people in all categories but he is concerned about people in general and not just in America.

Commissioner Jones stated that he has friends that are for the resolution and some against. He thanked citizens for their responses. He stated he will support the amendment, quoting I Timothy 5:8, which he stated is shaping his perspective on this issue.

The Chairman called for a vote on the amended resolution on the table, which was originally moved by Commissioner Dacey and seconded by Commissioner Mark. The motion to adopt carried with six (6) "Ayes", there being one (1) "Nay" from Commissioner Sampson.

At 8:56 p.m. the Board went into recess.

At 9:15 p.m. the Board reconvened in regular session.

APPOINTMENTS

Craven Community Child Protection Team: Dawn Gibson

It was the consensus of the Board that this appointment be deferred.

Craven County Clean Sweep Committee: Pamela Roberts

Commissioner Mark nominated Pamela Roberts for appointment to the Craven County Clean Sweep Committee. There being no additional nominations, Ms. Roberts was appointed by acclamation.

Craven Aging Planning Board

The Board was apprised of the expiring terms of Gwen Bryan, Tonya Cedars, Jayne Davis, Sherry Roy, Dora Jones, Mary Ann Mchan, Georgia Newkirk, Deborah Patterson and Dean Roberts on the Craven Aging Planning Board. Commissioner Sampson moved to reappoint Ms. Bryan, Ms. Cedars, Ms. Davis, Ms. Roy, Ms. Jones, Ms. Mchan, Ms. Newkirk, and Ms. Patterson, seconded by Commissioner McCabe and unanimously carried. The appointment of Dean Roberts was deferred until March.

Craven County Community Child Protection Team

It was the consensus of the Board to defer this appointment.

Nursing Home Advisory Committee

It was the consensus of the Board that this appointment be deferred.

Board of Adjustment: Lee Kyle Allen III, Bud Stilley

The Board was apprised of the expiring terms of Lee Kyle Allen, III and Bud Stilley on the Board of adjustment. It was the consensus to defer appointment of Lee Kyle Allen, III until March. Mr. Stilley was reappointed by acclamation.

COUNTY ATTORNEY'S REPORT

Initial Offer to Purchase Real Property – 435 Prichard Avenue (#5-021063)

At the request of Commissioner McCabe, this item was deferred in order to receive more information regarding the offer.

COUNTY MANAGER'S REPORT

County Manager, Jack Veit, announced that the FY 2017 budget process kicked off earlier in the day and provided some significant dates.

- May 17 – May 27 are scheduled for budget work sessions. He asked that Commissioners check their calendars.
- May 16 – 2017 budget will be presented
- June 6 – public hearing
- June 20 – adoption of 2017 budget

He reported that he met with the School Board and three Commissioners recently and stated that a work session needs to be scheduled in late February or early March, and to include discussion of Joint Land Use Study (JLUS).

Mr. Veit asked for direction in regards to distribution of the adopted resolution concerning refugee resettlement.

He was directed to distribute it to the Congressional delegation, Governor McCrory, Department of Homeland Security/INS and to post it on the County's website.

COMMISSIONERS' REPORTS

Commissioner Mark reported on his recent attendance at Highway 17 and Highway 70 meetings. He stated that Congressman Butterfield spoke about eastern NC Interstate at the Hwy 17 meeting and the group voted on joining Highway 17 with Highway 64 for more impact with the Highway Transportation Board in getting roads completed. He stated that at the Highway 70 meeting, reports were given from Gus Tullas, Transportation Board member, John Rouse and Tim Little, engineers. They provided an update on projects: Greenville by-pass, Slocum gate and Kinston by-pass.

The group went into work session for planning priorities, which emerged as follows:

1. Havelock bypass corridor completion
2. Shalotte bypass
3. James City, which was his number one priority
4. Access to Port from Havelock bypass
5. Continue reducing traffic signals along the Hwy 70 Corridor

Commissioner Jones reported that he attended a discussion with the Board of Education. He stated that the Board of Commissioners takes school system issues very seriously. He commented that he attended a meeting on Saturday, January 30 in the Rocky Run Community.

Commissioner Tyson announced on February 24 at 2:00 p.m. a trash forum will be held at the Convention Center. At CarolinaEast on February 10 at 2:00 p.m. a groundbreaking ceremony will take place for the new cancer center. He reported on his attendance at an MPO meeting recently and announced improvements from Garner to the Havelock by-pass. He stated that \$150M will be coming from money that has stopped being transferred from the transportation trust fund to the general fund.

Commissioner Dacey thanked the Board for their time spent considering the resolution on refugees.

Commissioner McCabe commented that it was a difficult situation for him tonight.

Commissioner Sampson thanked the Chairman for keeping control of the meeting. He commented that gas prices continue to come down. He reported that at the RPO meeting they discussed some of the same issues as the MPO. He stated that on January 30 at Trinity Church as meeting was called by the New Bern Aldermen to organize a community clean-up and he participated in a Sampson Street clean-up.

Chairman Liner announced on February 4 at 1:00 p.m. at the Convention Center, a kick-off meeting for the Purple Heart dinner will be held here in August. On February 10 from 5:00 p.m.-7:00 p.m. at Havelock Community College, the S.T.E.M. Building rendering will be presented. He announced that on February 26, the Aviation Heritage Foundation banquet will be held and tickets are still available.

He thanked County Attorney, Jim Hicks, and County Manager, Jack Veit, for consultations and thanked the Board for the process during the meeting.
