Navigating the Road to Recovery

- **Homeowners and renters in three more North Carolina counties—Anson, Orange and Union—are now eligible to apply for disaster assistance under the Hurricane Florence declaration.** To be eligible, the uninsured storm damage must have occurred as a result of Florence between Sept. 7 and Sept. 29, 2018 and you must live in a designated county. If you have insurance, file your claim before applying for disaster assistance. To apply, go to disasterassistance.gov.
- **Disaster Recovery Centers continue to open in disaster-damaged communities.** To find locations and hours, go to fema.gov/DRC or download the FEMA mobile app. Center hours and operations are adjusted based on visitor demand.
- **The whole-community approach to recovery simply involves people helping people.** That's important when the needs go beyond the scope of assistance available from local, state and federal partners. FEMA has made more than **36,000** referrals to state, federal and voluntary agencies that provide goods, grants, loans or services for Hurricane Florence survivors.

Scope

- **31** counties designated for Individual Assistance
- **40** counties designated for Public Assistance (Categories A-G)
- **1** county designated for Public Assistance (Categories A-B only)
- **9** shelters open with a population of **397 survivors** (peak 21,272 on 9/15)

Overview

Nearly \$423 million in state and federal resources as of Oct. 15:

- **Nearly \$99 million** in state and federal grants were approved for homeowners and renters.
- **Nearly \$153 million** in low-interest disaster loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) were approved for 3,758 businesses, homeowners and renters.
- **An estimated \$170 million** in claims were paid by the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) to policyholders.

Individuals & Households Program (IHP)

Individuals and families in **31 counties** are eligible to apply for Individual Assistance: **Anson, Beaufort, Bladen, Brunswick, Carteret, Columbus, Craven, Cumberland, Duplin, Greene, Harnett, Hoke, Hyde, Johnston, Jones, Lee, Lenoir, Moore, New Hanover, Onslow, Orange, Pamlico, Pender, Pitt, Richmond, Robeson, Sampson, Scotland, Union, Wayne and Wilson.**

As of Oct. 15:

- IHP approved: nearly **\$99 million**
 - Housing Assistance approved: more than **\$82 million**
 - Other Needs Assistance approved: nearly **\$16 million**
- FEMA inspectors in the field: **180**
- FEMA inspections completed: **87,220 (98%) out of 88,594 assigned**
- More than **28,000** North Carolina homeowners and renters have received FEMA housing assistance, including grants for repairs to make their homes livable.
- Of those **28,000**, nearly **17,000** homeowners and renters have received financial rental assistance, FEMA’s quickest and most efficient temporary housing program for displaced survivors.
- **378 households**, representing **1,074 household members**, are currently checked into hotels through FEMA’s Transitional Sheltering Assistance program.

Disaster Recovery Centers (DRCs)

Centers have welcomed **14,040** visitors to date. The centers serve as one-stop shops for hurricane survivors who want to know [what to expect after registering for assistance](#).

U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA)

The SBA offers low-interest disaster loans to businesses of all sizes (including landlords), nonprofits, homeowners and renters to cover uninsured or uncompensated losses or damage from Florence.

- After registering for disaster assistance, applicants may be referred to the SBA. There’s no obligation to accept a loan, but you may miss out on the largest source of federal disaster recovery funds if you don’t apply.
- If you don’t qualify for an SBA disaster loan, you may be referred back to FEMA for Other Needs Assistance grants.
- As of Oct. 15, more than **\$153 million** in low-interest disaster loans have been approved by SBA for **3,758** homeowners, renters and business owners, which includes:
 - **Nearly \$143 million, 3,557** loans approved for homeowners and renters.
 - **More than \$10 million, 201** loans approved for business owners.

SBA Business Recovery Centers

Transitional Sheltering Assistance (TSA)

The [Transitional Sheltering Assistance](#) program provides short-term hotel stays to survivors who were displaced from their homes and need shelter while they look for longer-term housing.

- As of Oct. 15, there were **378 households** (1,074 total household members) checked into TSA-participating hotels.
- Survivors will be notified of their eligibility through an automated phone call, text message, and/or email depending upon the method of communication they selected when they registered for assistance. Or call the disaster assistance helpline at **800-621-3362** (voice, 711 or VRS) or **800-462-7585 (TTY)**.
- Transitional Sheltering Assistance is a **sheltering** option using participating hotels/motels to help fill a gap **until** survivors identify short- or long-term **housing** solutions.
- TSA is available to eligible survivors whose pre-disaster primary residence is in one of the following **nine** counties: **Brunswick, Carteret, Columbus, Craven, Jones, New Hanover, Onslow, Pender or Robeson**.
- Survivors who do not have the option to return home and are unable to have their housing needs met through insurance, congregate shelters, or rental assistance provided by FEMA or another agency (federal, state or voluntary) may be eligible for TSA.
- Survivors will be notified of their eligibility through an automated phone call, text message, and/or email depending upon the method of communication selected when they registered for assistance.
- To locate participating hotels, visit **DisasterAssistance.gov**, scroll down to the Quick Links section, and click on **“Transitional Sheltering Assistance Hotel Locator.”** Or you may call the disaster assistance helpline at **800-621-3362** (voice, 711 or VRS) or **800-462-7585 (TTY)**.
- Continued eligibility is determined on an individual basis. When eligibility for a particular household ends, those survivors will be notified seven days prior to their checkout date.
- FEMA provides rental assistance, home repair assistance and other forms of housing to help eligible survivors transition from TSA to a short or long-term **housing** option.

Direct Temporary Housing Assistance

- Based upon the needs identified by the State of North Carolina, FEMA is providing two forms of Direct Temporary Housing Assistance in **10** counties: **Brunswick, Carteret, Columbus, Craven, Duplin, Jones, Onslow, Pender, New Hanover and Robeson**.
 - *Travel Trailers* provide a timely, effective interim solution for most households with a high degree of confidence that repairs to their home can be completed in less than a year, ideally within six months.

- *Manufactured Housing Units* (MHUs) provide a longer-term solution for survivors whose repairs will take longer to complete due to greater degree of damage.
- These units are used only when rental resources are not available in the area.
- **FEMA contacts households that may qualify for a travel trailer or MHU** to conduct a pre-placement interview to determine whether the applicant needs direct housing and, if so, what type of housing. This determination is based on the size and needs of the household, including any people with disabilities or other access or functional needs.
- FEMA specialists work closely with displaced survivors on their housing needs and keep them up-to-date on program details and deadlines with face-to-face meetings, phone calls and letters. Survivors also have access to a toll-free helpline to help them as they make plans for permanent housing.

U.S. Housing and Urban Development

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has activated the Disaster Assistance Hotline for Survivors. North Carolinians living in HUD-assisted housing who were affected by Hurricane Florence can call **800-304-9320** to learn about resources available from HUD. They can also email recovery@hud.gov to contact HUD.

Disaster Assistance for Farmers and Ranchers

Farmers and ranchers are also eligible for disaster assistance for damage or losses from Florence. Along with FEMA grants and SBA loans, farmers and ranchers are eligible for emergency loans through the U.S. Department of Agriculture’s Farm Service Agency (FSA). Eligible losses covered by emergency loans and other programs may include crops and livestock. Mitigation Outreach

Disaster survivors can get tips and advice on how to rebuild stronger against future storm damage from FEMA flood mitigation specialists at Disaster Recovery Centers and at select hardware and home improvement stores for a limited time.

The specialists can answer questions about home repair, making disaster plans, putting together supply kits and the importance of flood insurance. Their schedule follows:

Disaster Legal Services

Free legal services are available for low-income survivors of Hurricane Florence. For legal assistance, call the **Disaster Legal Hotline** at **833-242-3549**.

Disaster Distress Helpline

If you're feeling stressed or overwhelmed by Florence, call the **Disaster Distress Helpline** at **800-985-5990** (voice, 711 or VRS) any time day or night to speak with a trained crisis counselor. Or text TalkWithUs to 66746. For Spanish, text Hablanos to 66746.

Disaster Unemployment Assistance

If you're out of work or lost income due to Florence, you may be eligible for Disaster Unemployment Assistance (DUA). DUA helps those who do not qualify for regular unemployment benefits—such as farm laborers and self-employed workers. To apply, call **866-795-8877**. Disaster Survivor Assistance (DSA)

Dozens of DSA crews are talking to survivors out in storm-damaged communities. Crew members can answer questions, register survivors and make referrals to community partners. All FEMA employees and contractors carry an official government or contractor badge to identify themselves. To guard against fraud, survivors should ask to see a badge.

- To date, the crews have visited nearly **57,000** homes, registered nearly **3,900** survivors and made nearly **3,300** case updates and inquiries.

Unmet Needs

FEMA works closely with state, federal, faith-based and voluntary agency partners. Survivors who do not qualify for FEMA disaster assistance may call **2-1-1**, the statewide information and referral service for basic unmet needs—such as food or cleaning supplies and help to pay utility bills and child care expenses.

National Flood Insurance Program

- To help speed recovery, the [National Flood Insurance Program](#) is allowing advanced payments to policyholders on their flood insurance claims.
- Policyholders who contact their insurer can receive an advance payment of up to \$5,000 on a flood claim, without an adjuster visit or additional documentation.
- NFIP policyholders who have not yet filed a claim should call their agent or insurance company and file immediately. Policyholders who need assistance contacting their insurance company can contact the NFIP Call Center at **800-427-4661**.

- As of Oct. 15, NFIP has already paid out an estimated **\$170 million** in claims to policyholders in North Carolina affected by Florence. Roughly **14,000** claims have been filed in North Carolina.

Public Assistance

- FEMA’s Public Assistance program provides grants to state, local and tribal governments, and to certain types of private non-profit organizations so that communities can quickly respond to and recover from major disasters or emergencies.
- These funds reimburse eligible applicants for the cost of life-saving emergency protective measures, debris removal, and the repair, replacement, or restoration of disaster-damaged facilities like buildings, roads, and utilities.
- FEMA reimburses applicants not less than 75 percent of the eligible cost of a project. The state determines how the non-federal share of the cost of a project (up to 25 percent) is split with the sub-recipients like local and county governments.
- Government entities and non-profit organizations must provide a formal Request for Public Assistance to the State of North Carolina to be considered for a grant. The deadlines are:
 - **November 11:** for Alleghany, Anson, Ashe, Cabarrus, Chatham, Dare, Granville, Montgomery, Person, Randolph, Stanly, Union, and Yancey Counties.
 - **November 16:** Beaufort, Bladen, Brunswick, Carteret, Columbus, Craven, Cumberland, Duplin, Greene, Harnett, Hoke, Hyde, Johnston, Jones, Lee, Lenoir, Moore, New Hanover, Onslow, Pamlico, Pender, Pitt, Richmond, Robeson, Sampson, Scotland, Wayne, and Wilson Counties.
